

WORSHIPPING IS KEY

In January I was back in my old Diocese of Exeter, marking the death of Sabine Baring Gould 100 years before.

What an extraordinary person he was, with an incredible range and roundedness of learning and interests, in an equally full and fulfilled life. He was a great traveller and prolific writer of biographies, folklore, travel books, theology, novels and hymns, including some, such as 'Onward Christian Soldiers', that remain popular today. He was a linguist and translator; and, as an archaeologist on Dartmoor, very much a pioneer in the field. For many, his greatest achievement was his collecting the old folk songs of Devon and Cornwall, providing inspiration for such composers as Elgar, Vaughan Williams and Holst. He was also the Squire of Lewtrenchard and, being ordained, he appointed himself as parish priest as well!

This he saw as his true vocation. His responsibility, and that of the local church, was the cure of souls from cradle to grave. This meant a care for the spiritual wellbeing of all in the community and for their bodily and social welfare too. Striving for good health and housing must go hand in hand with growth in faith and prayer. All should be encouraged to full humanity, to holy discipleship, to the recognition, and use, of whatever gifts anyone possessed for the common good.

But, underlying all of this, one other aspect of this great man's life speaks very strongly to me now. That is how he understood worship and its relationship to the whole of life. 'To worship is to quicken the conscience by the holiness of God, to feed the mind with the truth of God, to purge the imagination by the beauty of God, to open the heart to the love of God, to devote the will to the purpose of God'.

Worshipping is key. I am reminded of the later words of Archbishop William Temple: 'It is sometimes said that conduct is supremely important, and worship helps it. The truth is that worship is supremely important and conduct tests it.'



CATHEDRAL ADMISSION CHANGES

on Monday April 8th in Pilton Village Hall at 7.30pm Bryn Hawkins, who is the chairman of the Somerset Miners' Welfare Trust, will tell us of his story "FROM BOY TO MAN IN THE SOMERSET COALFIELD"

"I will tell you about the history of my family in the mining industry from 1908/09, with a special story about my grandfather when he was shot in the legs. My own story started at the age of 14, when I started my engineer's apprenticeship at the end of July 1956 with the National Coal Board at Camerton pit, where my father had also started work at 14. It upset me when all the other lads were going underground, and I had to wait until the second week in September to take my first excursion in the cage to go down the pit. I ended up at Norton Hill Colliery having worked for the NCB until 1973, when the final pits closed."

HAPPY CIRCLE

Dudley read us a description of transport built and piloted by children in the 1940s and 50s. One essential vehicle was the soapbox, or dilly, usually an assembly of a wooden box, pram wheels and a wooden chassis steered by string with feet for brakes and powered by an enthusiastic push from friends. A decent hill added to the fun and very little traffic meant it was 'safe'.

Boats and rafts were necessary if there was a pond or stream. We heard of the maiden voyage of a half barrel boat which had string attached ready to retrieve HMS Barrel on demand. Captained by a young cousin the boat was launched but rather than sail straight it went round and round, as did the string. When the lad stood and asked to return to land the string was pulled, the barrel rotated, and the captain shot into the pond.

Members contributed their own recollections of home-built sledges, carts and boats enjoyed during the long holidays of childhood.
